About the Directors

Verena Mösenbichler-Bryant serves as Professor of the Practice of Music at Duke University, Director of the Duke University Wind Symphony, Director of Undergraduate Studies for the music department, and Artistic Director & conductor of the Durham Medical Orchestra.

Verena grew up in Eberschwang, Austria. She began piano lessons at the age of 6, continuing later with church organ, flute, and bassoon. Her conducting debut at age 16 was followed by a three-year fundamental conducting course taught by Johann Mösenbichler. She then studied symphony orchestra conducting with Ingo Ingensand at the Anton Bruckner Private University in Linz, Upper Austria, and received her bachelor's degree, with distinction, in 2005. She completed her Master of Music in 2007 with Kevin Sedatole at Michigan State University. Verena graduated in May 2009 with her DMA in Wind Ensemble Conducting from The University of Texas at Austin where her principal conducting teacher was Jerry Junkin.

Professional engagements have included three years as the conductor of the Hofkirchen community band, conducting the youth band of Eberschwang, conductor of the UNCSA Wind Ensemble and she currently serves as Associate Artistic Director of the Mid EUROPE festival, Executive Director of the World Youth Wind Orchestra Project, and the World Adult Wind Orchestra Project in Schladming, Austria (www.mideurope.at). Her transcriptions of John Corigliano's Grammy-winning work, *Mr. Tambourine Man*, for Wind Ensemble and Amplified Soprano, published by G. Schirmer and Eric Whitacre's *Sing Gently* and *Goodnight Moon*, published by Hal Leonard, have received strong praise from the composers, and have received numerous performances. Verena serves as Music Director and conductor of the Schwäbisches Jugendblasorchester and the Eifelphilharmonie, both located in Germany and frequently serves as guest conductor and clinician across the United States, Japan, as well as in her native Austria.

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Harry Davidson is in his twenty-fourth season as Music Director and Conductor of the Duke Symphony Orchestra and Professor of the Practice of Music at Duke University. In spring 2007, he was named Music Director and Conductor of Opera at the Cleveland Institute of Music, where he conducts one opera production each semester while continuing in his role as Music Director of the DSO.

In July 2000, he made his major orchestra conducting debut, leading the National Symphony Orchestra in concert at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. Mr. Davidson has guest conducted orchestras in Austria, Finland and the U.S., including the Charlotte and Akron symphonies, as well as the Symphony and Chamber Orchestras of the Oberlin College Conservatory of Music, where he has held residencies on two occasions. He has held the positions of Associate Conductor of the Wichita Symphony Orchestra, Professor of Music and Director of Orchestras at Wichita State University, Conductor of the Cleveland Orchestra Youth Orchestra and Associate Professor of Music at the University of Akron. In the past, he has served as a cover conductor for the North Carolina Symphony and the Cleveland Orchestra.

Mr. Davidson was a finalist in the Detroit Symphony's Antal Dorati Conducting Competition and the Hans Swarowsky Conducting Competition in Vienna.

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Allan Friedman directs the Duke Chorale in addition to serving as the Director of Music at Judea Reform Congregation, as well as the Director for SONAM (Singers of New and Ancient Music). He is a proud alumnus of Duke University (T '99) with a Music Major, including studies in South Africa with Ladysmith Black Mambazo, a Masters in Music Musicology from UNC - Chapel Hill (2001), and a D.M.A. in Choral Conducting from Boston University (2005) with a dissertation on Russian Jewish Choral Music. His training has included studies with Rodney Wynkoop, Susan Klebanow, Ann Howard Jones, and Joshua Jacobson. In his more than 20 years of conducting experience, Allan has delighted in making vocal music with people of diverse ages, backgrounds, and musical experiences.

The **Duke University Wind Symphony** has a long tradition of leadership in the college band field. It is composed largely of non-majors (both undergraduate and graduate) who wish to challenge themselves by performing the finest wind ensemble literature at a high level of artistry. The Wind Symphony gives at least four formal concerts each year, in addition to the annual Family Weekend concert in the Duke Chapel. The Wind Symphony's repertoire explores musical styles from the Medieval Period to the 21st Century. Programs feature chamber works and pieces that employ the lush sonorities of the large symphonic ensemble, and such composers as Susato, Bach, Mozart, Holst, Grainger, Sousa, Ives, Gershwin, as well as those writing for the medium today are represented. Each year the Duke University Wind Symphony premieres works by Duke composition students. The ensemble collaborates frequently with guest soloists, guest conductors as well as other ensembles. Recent guest soloists include Susan Fancher, Joseph Robinson, The John Brown Jazz Trio, The North Carolina Saxophone Ensemble, and Eric Whitacre. The Wind Symphony's rich tradition of excellence extends beyond the Duke campus, as evidenced by the long-standing participation and support from valued community members within its ranks, as well as performances at various community venues, such as annual Christmas concerts at area retirement centers.

Dr. Verena Mösenbichler-Bryant has been director of the Wind Symphony since Fall 2009.

Keyboard Nathaniel Maxwell The **Duke University Chorale**, the primary choral group of the Department of Music at Duke, is composed of 50 singers striving to make beautiful, informed, and meaningful music. The Chorale sings sacred and secular music from a variety of eras and traditions in concerts throughout the year, including a Family Weekend Concert, Holiday Concert in Duke Chapel, a benefit concert for a Durham charity, and a Spring Concert with orchestra.

The Chorale's repertoire spans over 500 years of choral music from both Western and non-Western traditions, much of it unaccompanied. In recent years the Chorale has also performed major works with orchestra, including Rutter's *Requiem*, Philip Glass's *Itaipu*, Bach's *St. John Passion*, Mendelssohn's *St. Paul*, and Britten's *War Requiem*.

Because of its strong ties to the university and community, the Chorale sings not only on campus, in formal concerts as well as occasional university events and Duke basketball games, but also in less formal settings like the Durham Rescue Mission, non-profit organizations, and area nursing homes. Their family-style Christmas program fills Duke Chapel every year with audience members of all ages, who bring large amounts of food for area homeless shelters.

Formed in 1970 when the Men's and Women's Glee Clubs were combined into a single choir, the Chorale has a long-standing tradition of touring during Duke's Spring Break. Past international tours, which occur every four years, have taken the group to China, Central America, and many parts of Europe, while their domestic tours alternate between California, the Northeast, and the Southeast.
